# Give me a drink

Thirst and hunger bring people together and break down barriers. Under the midday sun, after a long journey, a Jewish man and a Samaritan woman, who would usually not have anything to do with each, are just two thirsty people.

At first the woman is suspicious of Jesus, but he earns her trust and the obstacles between them are overcome. He asks her for a drink because she has a bucket and he doesn't. Once that basic human need is satisfied, he offers her a different kind of drink, water that will not just satisfy her physical thirst, but will become a spring of life welling up within her. Jesus is thirsty from his journey but he is also thirsting for people who are willing to receive the gift of life he offers. The woman is thirsty from carrying the bucket all the way from the town, but she also thirsting for life and love. She has had five husbands but now she is alone: we don't know the details of that story but it cannot be a happy one.

Scholars tell us that the five husbands may stand for the five gods that the Samaritan people worshipped, false gods who could not give them life. Instead of these, Jesus offers the woman a life-giving relationship with his Father, the one true God.

Once she has overcome her fear and realised what gift she is being offered and who is offering it to her, she leaves behind the once-treasured bucket of cool water and runs back to the town to spread the good news and her joy is so infectious that the people follow her back to Jesus.

Millions of people in in deprived parts of our world are in danger of dying from hunger, thirst and disease. In the name of our shared humanity, we must respond to these basic human needs, at home and abroad, but we must also be aware that, as Mother Teresa said, spiritual poverty is as real as material poverty. Many people today, even those who are not physically hungry or thirsty, are desperate for the true life and joy that comes from knowing they are loved by the Father who made them. We have received that gift and we can offer it to others.
