Jesus liked to stay at the house of Martha, Mary and Lazarus, his friends at Bethany, when he was in Judea. On one occasion Martha, busily serving the Master, asked him to persuade Mary to help her. Without in any way reproaching

Martha, Jesus explained to her that certain souls, called by God, should choose a better part still — the primary duty of listening to him and contemplating him. Some of us are more like Martha and some of us are more like Mary; but there is in all of us a built in need to combine the two within us.

## "What would you like me to give you?"

This is the question the Lord presents to Solomon in his dream in today's first reading. What an opportunity! If we were asked the same question; how would we answer? A second home in the Bahamas, perhaps? Or a new car? Or even a win on the Lottery?

Solomon asks not for any great material good - he asks for "a heart to understand how to discern between good and evil." The Lord is pleased by his request and so blesses him with the great gift of wisdom.

When we pray and speak to God, do we ask for the right things? Are our requests for our own motives? Do we take in the welfare of others or some greater need? I have been amazed over this period of Lockdown, especially when talking to some of the most vulnerable members of our communities, how upon admitting they are struggling to an extent in their own lives, they are quick to follow up with, "But, I'm praying for everyone when I say my rosary, Father" or "I thought I'd give so-and-so a call, just to see how they are."

I think any time we open ourselves up to God in prayer it pleases God, but when we are able to see the broader picture and include other people and other events in our prayers, we reflect God's outpouring of love for His people and imitate that "dance of love" which is the Holy Trinity.

This Lockdown has been a tremendous struggle for so many people in a wide variety of ways. However, Pope Francis commented in an empty St Peter's Square in March, "we have realized that we are on the same boat, all of us fragile and disoriented, but at the same time important and needed, all of us called to row together, each of us in need of comforting the other. On this boat... so we too have realized that we cannot go on thinking of ourselves, but only together can we do this."

May God bless all of us and our loved ones at this time and help us to imitate the wisdom of Solomon in asking the Lord for gifts which will, not only please Him, but help all of us to come closer together.
