### St. Aidan and Saints of Lindisfarne - August 31st

The first person whose name we know who lived on the island of Lindisfarne was St. Aidan. It was on this island that Aidan establish an Irish-type monastery of wooden buildings, a small church, small circular dwelling huts, and workshops. Here the monks lived a life of prayer, study and austerity. From here they went out and sowed the seeds of Christian communities.

We do not know who first brought Christianity to this country way back in the days of the Roman empire. We have no obvious original apostle. Yet, if we must choose one man to be called "Apostle of England" it could be claimed that Aidan is that man. "Apostle of Northumbria" he certainly was.

We know that many of our sick and housebound people are hungering for the Eucharist and we are hoping that soon we may be able to resume the wonderful ministry of bringing them Holy Communion. To help us prepare for that time, we need to recruit some more Eucharistic Ministers who are not in the vulnerable categories for Covid19. ### The Journey of the Cross

When reading the autobiography of Bear Grylls, he described the most difficult mission as his attempt to climb Mount Everest. Here was a man who was supremely fit and strong, both physically and mentally. However, for someone who is famous for overcoming all obstacles and challenges, Everest tested him to the maximum. The continuous slog of trudging through snow, the difficulty of breathing at high altitude, the brain saying "enough is enough". It was a test in every sense of the word.

The journey of the Cross can often feel like this experience. But Jesus encourages us in today's Gospel that the Cross is something we should undergo. He tells us, "If anyone wants to be a follower of mine...take up his cross and follow me." Just like reaching the summit of Everest was a difficult path to take, similarly, for the Christian, it is a difficult path that leads to the pinnacle of Christian life - eternal life.

The journey of the Cross comes in many different ways from person to person but its challenge is without fail always difficult, and can feel like it is testing us to the maximum of our own personal resources. It can also feel like the loneliest path as we struggle under its weight. However, just as the climber is rarely alone, with a team of helpers to carry equipment, guide the way and offer support and encouragement, so too, the Christian is aided by the help of our Lord, the protection of our Blessed Lady, the intercession of the Saints and the companionship of our Guardian Angels. Added to this, the invaluable help we receive from our own families, friends and colleagues - all contributing towards our efforts to be followers of Christ.

To reach the summit for Bear Grylls, there was no way of avoiding the struggle that he was going through. But, on reaching the top: the elation of getting there, the rest that could now be taken, the glory of reaching the pinnacle of mountaineering aspirations. The Cross is, indeed, unique to each person, but it always leads to the same most glorious summit - everlasting peace and joy in heaven. This is the destination for all those who place their trust in God and follow the path of their leader.
