How to win back a brother or sister

In every family and every community there are quarrels, disagreements and fallings out: that's only human. The sign of being a strong family or community is that we know how to make up after we've fallen out.

In today's gospel Jesus gives us good advice about how to do that, and the most important thing about this advice is the context in which he puts it. In the passage immediately before this he tells the story about the shepherd who will leave the ninety-nine sheep on the hillside to go off and search for the one that has wandered away and who will be full of joy when he manages to bring the lost one home. In the passage that follows Jesus tells Peter that he must forgive his brother who wrongs him, not seven times, but seventy-seven times.

So the main point is that we must always be ready to forgive each other, just as the Father is always ready to forgive us, and the advice Jesus offers is about how we do that. The first rule is not to make things worse by telling everybody about it, but to have the courage and the love to approach the one who has hurt us, face to face, one to one, really wanting to restore the relationship that has been damaged and being ready to rejoice at winning back our brother or sister. Only if that fails should we involve one or two others, the people who are most likely to succeed in persuading the other person to make things up. If that is unsuccessful, we can try asking the community to intervene. The final resort, Jesus advises, is to treat the person like a pagan or a tax-collector, someone who doesn't belong to the community. And the way Jesus treated those people was not to ignore or insult them, but to leave them free to go their own way, always making clear that he would love them to be drawn into the life of the community.

This makes so much sense, but it is so far from the way we usually behave that it is a real challenge to us. Our motivation should not be self-pity or self-righteousness, wanting to get even or to be proved right. If we act out of love for one another, we will do the right thing because, as St Paul tells us in the second reading today, love is the one thing that cannot hurt our neighbour.
