Suffering and humiliation

I know of somebody who, when at Primary school and it came to his turn to read, would send his twin brother up to read for him in order to avoid the struggling and humiliating experience of trying to read in front of the class. It was better for somebody to take his place than to suffer in public.

In our First reading today from Leviticus, it is difficult not to appreciate the suffering and humiliation that the leper had to undergo; the physical discomfort, the isolation and the humiliating experience of being cast out from society and into the margins. The whole person of the leper would be deeply disturbed and affected.

Of suffering and humiliation, a friend described it thus, 'whenever we see someone who is unable to protect herself or himself against pain, especially the type of pain that humbles and humiliates, we are witnessing the humiliation of God in the world'.

With that in mind, the Gospel shows us the closeness and empathy of God to the human race - Jesus's healing of the leper to the extent that, in casting out the disease and restoring the leper to healing and freedom, it is Jesus Himself who can no longer move about freely and is pushed out into the margins of the countryside. A role-reversal of sacrifice for the gift of new life.

Many of us will have been touched by suffering and humiliations over these last 12 months - either in ourselves or in those close to us. It is there that God meets us, God taking his place with us out of solidarity, love and compassion. 'God shines brightly in our humiliations, unafraid to be embarrassed in this world', is how the same friend commented upon it.

Moreover, this week we begin the season of Lent which leads to the pinnacle of suffering and humiliation in Jesus's acceptance of the Cross - a result of love poured out for the world. In the mystery of the Cross we see an imitation of how Jesus lived his life; God being in the midst of his people, and willing to take on our burden of sin, shame and human frailty in order to present us with the gift of new life.
