Re-opening our churches - volunteers needed

We are really grateful to the parishioners who have volunteered as stewards in both churches for the Masses when we were able to be open and for funerals during the last months. As we prepare gradually to open up for more services, including baptisms and weddings, with the Government's required precautions still in place, we will need more volunteers to do welcoming, track and trace, hand sanitising and cleaning benches, door handles etc., especially when there may be multiple services on the same day. If you are able to help, either at weekends or during the week, and are not in a clinically vulnerable category, please email the relevant parish office letting us know which days and times you can be available. Once we have enough volunteers we will make a decision as to how soon and how often we can safely open each church. As all the phases of the road map are dependent on the Government's assessment of their effect on the pandemic and may well be delayed, any advance bookings for weddings or baptisms can only be provisional

First Holy Communion

We hope to be able to celebrate First Holy Communion sometime during 2021 but we don't yet know when that will be possible. If you have a child in Year 4 or above who wishes to receive Holy Communion, please contact the parish offices to request a registration form. The *With You Always* preparation material for

parents and children is now available online, so families are encouraged to access them and begin working through them as soon as possible (though the Church Treasure Hunt in Session 1 will have to wait until restrictions are lifted).

Do Christians Have Teeth?

Nowadays we are discouraged from showing anger, it definitely isn't politically correct. We are encouraged to keep calm, sit round a table and talk things through. Those who can't keep their tempers are encouraged to seek professional help, undergo anger management classes perhaps. At the end of the day, when we lose our cool we are bound to say or do things that we will later regret. Nine times out of ten, it is much better to take a deep breath, stand back from a situation and deal with it rationally and calmly.

However there are situations where we do need to feel and show our anger. If for instance we can watch cruelty, neglect, racism, greed and injustice without feeling one jot of anger, what does that say about us? If we don't feel any anger about anything perhaps it's because we don't really care. Sometimes we need to feel anger to goad us into putting something right. How often do we see the families of victims of crime, motivated by the pain of anger and loss, campaigning for new and better laws. Clearly anger has a place.

Today Jesus is angered to find corrupt money lenders taking over his beloved temple. He acts in a way that surprises us. We are used to Jesus being the voice of reason. We are used to Jesus speaking of love and forgiveness. Suddenly Jesus shows passion and zeal. Here is something that Jesus is angry about and he drives the corrupt marketers out with a whip. After Jesus clears out the temple, John tells us the Temple will be replaced by a new sanctuary where people can meet God ... in the person of the risen Jesus himself.

Today's gospel reading is not promoting aggressive or violent solutions; that is definitely not what Jesus is about. But what we can take from this gospel is that being passive in the face of wrong is not an option. There are times when we need to make a stand. There are occasions when Christians need to show the world their teeth.
