Chrism Mass at the Cathedral 6pm Wednesday 31st March

At the Chrism Mass Archbishop Malcolm will bless the Holy Oils to be used in the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Anointing of the Sick in all our parishes during the coming year and all the priests present will renew the promises they made at their ordination. Good Friday Holy Land Collection

This collection was born from the desire of the Popes to maintain a strong link between all the faithful and the Holy Places. It is the main source of material support for Christian life in the Holy Land and is a way that the faithful across the world can express solidarity with the ecclesial communities of the Middle East. Through these funds, the Franciscan Custody of the Holy Land is able to carry out the important mission to which it is called: preserving the Sacred Places, the stones of memory, and promoting the Christian presence, the living stones, through many pastoral, educational, welfare, health and social structures. As a rule, the Custody of the Holy Land receives 65% of the collection, while the remaining 35% goes to the Congregation for the Eastern Churches, which uses it for the formation of candidates for the priesthood, the support of the clergy, educational activities, cultural formation and subsidies to the various ecclesiastical circumscriptions in the Middle East. This is a difficult time financially for everyone, including those who live and work in the Holy Land. May this year's collection pro Terra Sancta be an opportunity not to ignore the difficult situation of our brothers and sisters of the Holy Places but rather to lighten burdens.

Reflection

Jesus starts another Exodus---- a journey from life to death--- and yet it's not the end but rather the beginning of new life and hope for all. He's prepared to pay the ultimate sacrifice and final humiliation, that of death on a cross. Jesus enters Jerusalem with crowds waving palm branches and welcoming Him, these are the same people who would finally demand His execution. Was his motive to lay down the final challenge to his people to accept His message and the coming of the kingdom of God?

With the knowledge that this action would certainly cost Him His life. He knew the suffering that He would endure, His Passion, betrayal by a so-called friend, His trial, torture and acceptance of His cross without any protest --- but instead with humility.

I'm reminded of, visiting an elderly lady living in a nursing home crippled by arthritis, when asked how she was, she obviously was in a lot of pain, her only concern was that of one for other people, inquiring about their health, she was accepting her pain with the phrase we all have our cross to bear and offering her suffering up to God for the souls in purgatory. Listening to this lady was a privilege and a reminder to consider one's own humility.

We can only wonder about what kind of thoughts were running through the mind of Jesus as He sat down to the final meal with His Apostles, He gave them bread and wine and in doing so instituted the Eucharist and gave us His body and blood, His only concern was that of one for other people.

He was sitting with Judas, but did not make it known that Judas would betray Him; He just accepted the inevitable.

In the agony in the garden He suffered pain, torment, self-doubt and loneliness --- human emotions that we ourselves experience --- He accepted them for our sins and our salvation. He was denied by his friends and tortured by His enemies and by accepting the cross on His shoulders He not only took the weight of the cross but also the weight of our sins. His only concern was that the people who were inflicting this pain, should be forgiven.

Throughout His suffering Jesus teaches us humility, the importance of forgiveness and of forgiving and how sensitivity is required to the needs of others. His suffering gives meaning to all human suffering, especially that of His people.
