### He opened their minds

A closed mind is a sad thing, because it cannot take in good news. Our minds can be closed for all sorts of reasons. Prejudice, fear, past hurts, bereavement, sadness and many other negative emotions can block our capacity to see beauty and goodness. The disciples of Jesus were no exception. They had been traumatised by the destruction of their hopes and the fear that they might share their master's fate. Whenever the risen Jesus appeared to them, he had to prise open their closed consciousness before they could recognise him.

Part of this opening process was Jesus explaining the Scriptures to them, and the Word of God is still a vital resource for opening our minds to the wonder and mystery of God's plan for the world. But the most powerful keys for unlocking their closed hearts were his wounded hands and feet and the simple act of eating. Flesh and food are the effective signs of the presence of the risen Lord among his followers. Once they touched the hands and feet bearing 'the scars that speak of sacrifice' and they saw him, before their very eyes, taking food, giving thanks for it, breaking and sharing it, all their barriers to belief were breached.

Their minds were opened to be able to believe in his presence, real, living and active amongst them, and also in his message of the fulfilment of God's plan of salvation for all people. Jonah famously sulked because God pardoned the people of Nineveh after they repented when Jonah delivered God's ultimatum, but the followers of Jesus were sent out to all the nations rejoicing with his message of repentance for the forgiveness of sins.

In every Mass we are nourished by his Word and fed with his own flesh and blood. May these powerful keys open our minds to see his risen presence everywhere, especially in the suffering faces of our brothers and sisters who are in need, and to rejoice in bringing them the good news that he can wipe their sins away.
