After the angel Gabriel had announced to Mary that she was to become the mother of Our Lord, Mary went from Galilee to Judea to visit her kinswoman Elizabeth, soon to be the mother of John the Baptist. Elizabeth greeted Mary with the words, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb." Mary burst

forth with the song of praise, which we call the Magnificat, beginning, "My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord." We are told that even John the Baptist, still unborn, leaped for joy in his mother's womb. We are shown, side by side, the two women, one seemingly too old to have a child, but destined to bear the last prophet of the Old Covenant, of the age that was passing away; and the other woman, seemingly not ready to have a child, but destined to bear the one who was himself the beginning of the New Covenant, the age that would not pass away.

Would you like to dance?

We recently received a letter from Fr Peter Fleetwood concerning an article written by a Doctor who was head of trauma surgery at a Medical Centre in Israel. It was a very enlightening and heart-warming written piece, especially in the light of the recent troubles in the Holy Land. To cut a long story short, the crux of the piece centred around a point one morning, after a heavy night's Surgery for the Doctor and his team. He looked around the room among those who had been helping to save others through the night, and as he scoured the room with his tired eyes, he saw people of a variety of nationalities and backgrounds, including Arabs and Jews. He commented on how uplifting it was that people from different races or backgrounds could come together with a common goal, borne out of love for another.

The unity in diversity that we see in this story is a perfect example of what we celebrate today - Trinity Sunday; three Persons, one God. There are many examples of how to best describe and explain this ultimate riddle, and the best one I have heard is the description of the 'dance of love'. This expression signifies the active and united power that is rooted in this deepest mystery of our Catholic faith; each Person of the Trinity moving together and looking in love upon one another.

In our own parish community, we recognise that we are all different in many ways but we seek similar unity in diversity; being respectful and open to all members, providing a warm welcome to parishioners of different races, cultures, sexual orientation; and our diversity brought together in our worship of the one God who loves us all. On this theme, Pope Francis commented, 'if we are guided by faith, we recognize God creates men and women, not as objects, "but as people loved and capable of loving, in His image and likeness."'

In three weeks time we will come together as an Archdiocese at the Synod weekend to put our discernment of these past weeks and months into action. May our own hearts be tuned in to the God who speaks to all, in a spirit of prayer, wisdom and love, taking up as we do, God's invitation to join in the dance of love.
