

Settlement Scheme for European Citizens — Deadline 30 June 2021 A reminder that EU, EEA and Swiss citizens who were living in the UK by 31 December 2020 have until 30 June 2021 to apply for the Settlement Scheme. Those who do not apply are at risk of losing their rights to live and work here or access important services such as healthcare. Please note that Irish citizens do not need to apply. There is a particular concern about older and vulnerable people who may struggle to Page 8 of 10 navigate the process, require assistance with the online application or not even know that their status is at risk. The Word Within Us

Our Readings today show us a very arable theme, a theme that would be understood as much then as it is now.

We believe that Jesus would have learnt some carpentry skills from his father, but he would have also had to learn a degree of selfsufficiency from the land so that food could be grown to feed themselves.

Jesus seems to be very aware of what it takes to grow food from seed and when to harvest that food at the optimum time. He also sees the bigger picture, of how what grows assists the environment around it, giving shade, shelter, a vantage point

Our Gospel Acclamation tells us explicitly that the seed Jesus speaks of is the Word of God, this Word is sown by Christ into our hearts and this is where it will stay, growing inside of us until it is ready to be harvested or used.

This in turn makes me think of my own garden, a place of where time can be enjoyed taking in the beauty of nature. Now I cannot take any credit for what grows in my garden, that is something my wife manages expertly, but we bought a plant very cheaply in a local supermarket when we moved in. I couldn't even hazard a guess at its name, but this plant has grown year on year, and year on year it produces beautiful purple flowers. We call it the "bee bush" because as soon as it starts to bloom it proves to be a magnet for the local bees.

This plant not only makes me smile when I look at it, but it sustains our bees, which in turn help to sustain our local nature. That is how the Word of God works, it should make us smile, and that smile should help sustain everything around us.
