They'll know we are Christians by our love

You are what you eat' is a slogan that has been around for some time, as many people these days are rightly concerned about eating healthily. At the heart of the Jewish law are the great commandments Moses described to the people as God's gift, precepts which, if kept and observed, would lead to a wise and just communal life, the envy of the peoples around. But the law also contains many detailed regulations about what to eat and how to eat it. Many of these regulations are rooted in common sense and good hygiene but they carry the same danger as all regulations – if we become obsessed with the details we can lose sight of the original purpose.

The Pharisees in today's Gospel passage complain that the disciples of Jesus are not following the strict rules about ritual washing before eating but they're not expecting the robust answer that Jesus gives. He calls out their hypocrisy in clinging to the smallest human traditions while neglecting the big challenges of God's commandments, and even using the rules to avoid their obligations to those in need. He turns on its head their concern about becoming ritually unclean by infringing the dietary laws and insists that what makes us good or bad is not what we eat but the way we treat others. James in the second reading says the same thing in different words: accepting and submitting to the Word that is in us means putting the great commandments of loving God and neighbour into practical action. Perhaps his version of the slogan would be 'You are what you do'.

As I prepare to move on from serving these two great parish communities I'm filled with gratitude and amazement, not just at the love and support that I've received from all of you, but at the many and varied ways in which the Word that is proclaimed in our churches is lived out in the homes, streets and workplaces of our neighbourhood and the love of Christ that we receive in the Eucharist is shared with those in need. I pray that under the guidance of Fr Anthony and Fr Carl these two communities will continue to grow in their witness to the power of God's love made visible in the lives of his people.
